There are 12 libraries that serve Delaware County and they are housed within 13 buildings. The libraries have free access to a wide variety of books and other materials for all ages. They offer a free comfortable space for families as well as provide interactive activities including story time, arts & crafts programs and summer reading programs. A bookmobile is featured in several towns around Delaware County.	
BEI Updated/ New Regulations	There were 12 updated/new regulations. A few of those were implemented on February 14 th 2024. - The number of documented clock hours of experience delivering services to children under five years of age has been reduced from 1600 to 1000.

EI HUB update	EI HUB launch has been pushed back to October 2024. Counties have requested in person and regional trainings to help prepare for the launch. A speech provider has chosen not to continue to provide EI services due to new EI Hub requirements.	
EI Service Coordination reports/trends/needs/gaps:	Our part time speech and part time occupational therapist positions remain vacant as well as our full time speech language pathology position. We initiated a targeted recruitment campaign beginning in April 2024 using some of our public health infrastructure grant funds. We will continue to reach out to colleges, canvass students returning to work locally and potentially canvass retired therapists. We still have one vacant Program Coordinator position, and this position would also provide service coordination. There are a total of 62 children enrolled in EI, 4 waiting for speech services, 2 waiting for occupational services and 2 waiting for physical therapy services. Virtual services include 20 receiving speech services, 8 receiving occupational therapy, 1 receiving physical therapy and 1 receiving special instruction. There are 3 families receiving virtual services who prefer in person services and are on a waitlist.	
	Rene shared that there several of her families in need of additional support. She has provided families with local resources for play and socialization such as the local library and has made referrals and encouraged families to look into Delaware Opportunities programs. Several families are also coming out of homeless shelters and are in need of furnishings and food and local food pantries and Delaware Opportunities are great resources. Families are trying to push towards virtual or phone monthly check ins rather
