

REGULAR MEETING

DELAWARE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

JUNE 24, 2020

The regular meeting of the Delaware County Board of Supervisors was held Wednesday, June 24, 2020 at 1:00 p.m. in the Supervisors' Room of the Senator Charles D. Cook County Office Building, 111 Main Street, Delhi, New York, Chairman Tina B. Molé presiding.

The Clerk called the roll and all Supervisors were present except Mr. Davis. Supervisors Vernold, Eisel, Pigford, and Layton attended via Zoom.

Mr. Marshfield offered the invocation.

Mr. Ellis led the Board in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as presented.

The Clerk noted that all communications received have been referred to their respective committees for review.

For standing committee reports, Chairman of the Capital Projects Committee Mark Tuthill announced that all permits are in place and they will be breaking ground next week for the new Behavioral Health Facility.

Mr. Eisel offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

**TITLE: 2020 BUDGET AMENDMENT
DISPOSITION OF DELAWARE COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY
ASSET FORFEITURE PROCEEDS

WHEREAS, the Delaware County District Attorney, working in conjunction with the Delaware County Sheriff's Office, the Village of Walton Police Department, and the New York State Police, has seized thirty-thousand six hundred eighty-six dollars (\$30,686.00); and

WHEREAS, the seized thirty-thousand six hundred eighty-six dollars (\$30,686.00) was determined to be proceeds obtained from the criminal activities of multiple defendants; and

WHEREAS, the District Attorney has obtained the forfeiture of these funds pursuant to New York State CPLR Article 13A during the criminal prosecution of said defendants; and

WHEREAS, the District Attorney has deposited said funds with the Delaware County

Treasurer as required pursuant to CPLR Article 13A, and the Treasurer is holding these funds as shown in the line titled 10-00000-34899000/1325886; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to CPLR Article 13A these forfeited funds must be divided among the Arresting Police Agency (41%), the District Attorney’s Office (27%), and the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports (32%).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Village of Walton Police Department receive five thousand five hundred ninety-one and 58/100 dollars (\$5,591.58); the New York State Police shall receive one hundred thirty-eight and 99/100 dollars (\$138.99); and the Delaware County Sheriff’s Office shall receive six thousand eight hundred fifty and 69/100 dollars (\$6,850.69); as each of their respective shares from the funds forfeited from each defendant’s case and shall be spent in accordance with the directives of CPLR Section 1349; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports shall receive nine thousand eight hundred nineteen and 52/100 dollars (\$9,819.52) as its share of the forfeited proceeds from each defendant’s case; and

In reply to Mr. Merrill, Sheriff DuMond confirmed this truck will be replaced with a leased vehicle.

In response to Mr. Marshfield, Sheriff DuMond stated the vehicle is in very good condition. The lease company will place this vehicle out to auction and the proceeds from the sale will roll back into the lease program. He confirmed that all the vehicles signed over to the lease company are being sold with proceeds rolling back into the program. Under the lease program, vehicles are being turned over sooner and are worth more for resale and he noted they are getting about twice as much than what they’ve received in the past from the auctions.

In answer to Mr. Marshfield, Sheriff DuMond stated this vehicle has approximately 70,000 miles on it.

TITLE: RESOLUTION CALLING ON THE STATE OF NEW YORK TO RELEASE ENHANCED FEDERAL MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDS TO COUNTIES AND NEW YORK CITY

WHEREAS, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Congress has enacted extraordinary measures to help states and localities with increased costs and lost revenue; and

WHEREAS, a key action enacted by the federal government was a 6.2 percent increase in the federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP); and

WHEREAS, Congress has used this mechanism to provide fiscal relief to states and their local government Medicaid funding partners to reduce the financial burden they often experience in an economic downturn; and

WHEREAS, we understand the State of New York has already drawn down about \$2.5 billion for the period January 1, 2020 through June 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, under federal law a portion of these funds are required to be passed through to counties and New York City; and

WHEREAS, we estimate the local share is about 20 percent; and

WHEREAS, counties and New York City are struggling with higher costs associated with responding to COVID-19 and experiencing extensive revenue declines due to the shutdown of large swaths of the economy; and

WHEREAS, in addition to mounting losses in local revenues, counties are also expecting significant cuts in state aid; and

WHEREAS, many counties have enacted plans to reduce non-mandated expenses to the degree they can without sacrificing public health and safety; and

WHEREAS, these expense reductions also require a review of the workforce, including layoffs; and

WHEREAS, we project that each quarter of enhanced FMAP funding is worth hundreds of millions of dollars for counties and New York City; and

WHEREAS, the State has been holding three years of similar enhanced FMAP payments owed to counties and New York City under the Affordable Care Act that are worth hundreds of millions of dollars.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County of Delaware is requesting that the State immediately release the first quarter of enhanced Medicaid federal matching funds for the pandemic response to Delaware County to provide some partial fiscal relief to the current conditions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED we request that the State provide a timeline to all counties on the release of the enhanced federal Medicaid matching funds related to the Affordable Care Act that have been withheld for years and the likely mechanism on how these funds will be delivered to counties and New York City; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED we understand the State is experiencing severe fiscal stress, as well, and we want to work cooperatively with the State to develop a plan on the release of the withheld federal enhanced Medicaid funds due to counties under the Affordable Care Act and future pandemic FMAP increased funding; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors forward copies of this resolution to Senator Charles E. Schumer, Senator Kirsten E. Gillibrand, Congressman Antonio R. Delgado, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, Senator James L. Seward, Senator Frederick J. Akshar, II, Senator Jen Metzger, Assemblyman Clifford W. Crouch, Assemblyman Brian D. Miller, and Assemblyman Christopher Tague, the New York State Association of Counties, and all others deemed necessary and appropriate.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Taggart.

Mr. Marshfield read from prepared notes. “We are all under financial stress from the federal level down through the state, counties, towns, and villages over the COVID-19 pandemic.

In mid-March, Congress passed the first coronavirus relief bill which increased the share of Medicaid spending that the federal government would cover which is called the Federal Medical Assistance Percentages (FMAP) by 6.2%. That change to enhance the FMAP reimbursement makes \$2.5 billion in federal funds available to New York to be split between the state and county governments. Counties and New York City, based on the amount of county tax dollars allocated to Medicaid, are expected to receive about \$500 million of these funds when the state releases the local share of FMAP. New York counties and the City of New York together pay \$7.5 billion for the state’s Medicaid program each year. New York is one of only a few states in the nation that does that.

Delaware County’s weekly share is \$160,230 or an annual \$8.33 million dollars per the

budget. The Department of Social Service's finance office analysis is that the state, rather than pay one lump sum of the 6.2%, will probably deduct a weekly amount of approximately \$9,934 from the \$160,230 payment.

The New York State Association of Counties (NYSAC) estimates that counties are owed about \$500 million due to the CARES Act (based on 6.2% increase in the federal share for Medicaid) and they also estimate that counties are already owed \$400 million due to the fact that the state is behind on the FMAP reconciliations. Then there is the HEROS Act, not yet passed in the Senate, which would increase the percentage from 6.2% to 14%.

This resolution is to call on the state to release the federal matching funds which they have and is rightfully ours. It means over a half million dollars in much needed funding for Delaware County. Your support would be appreciated."

TITLE: 2020 BUDGET AMENDMENT EMPIRE STATE DEVELOPMENT FOR COMPREHENSIVE STUDY OF HOUSING NEEDS AND AVAILABILITY PLANNING AND WATERSHED AFFAIRS

WHEREAS, the County has been awarded a grant for \$50,000 from Empire State Development to complete a comprehensive housing needs assessment, market analysis and long term strategy for housing demands throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, Empire State Development is providing this funding to assist municipalities in Delaware County to develop and market housing development projects to meet the needs of residents, aid businesses with issues of worker recruitment/retention and improve business development and community sustainability.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Delaware County Board of Supervisors accept this funding and authorize the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to enter into a contract with Empire State Development; and

In response to Ms. Molé, Director of Planning Shelly Johnson-Bennett confirmed this is a grant to do a county-wide housing study to support the land acquisition conversation about our lack of affordable housing availability. The grant is being matched by \$15,000 from the IDA and in-kind service from Planning staff.

In response to Mr. Valente concerning the timing of the study when the area is being flooded by people looking for safe havens, Mrs. Johnson-Bennett stated it is not so much about the value of the housing as it is availability at this point. A large part of the County comprehensive plan is to determine what the inventory of housing availability is in the County. The County Planning Board wanted to do an assessment to look at the variables surrounding housing as part of the County comprehensive plan.

Mrs. Johnson-Bennett stated they have a time frame of two years to complete the study. They are requesting to get the monies in place now because they heard from the state that if the money was not in contract, they could pull the funding.

Mr. Marshfield opined that many local residents have no affordable housing as properties are being bought up and that needs to be factored into this study.

Mr. Valente expressed that since September 11, 2001, and more so now, housing prices have gone up and homes are getting bought up—many purchased sight unseen.

Mr. Taggart stated that this grant gives them the option to go forward with the study, otherwise it will come out of the County's pocket.

In response to Mr. Marshfield, Director of Economic Development Glenn Nealis concurred that a number of federal programs are available that support housing and are specifically geared towards low and moderate income thresholds.

Mr. Hinkley commented that broadband access is much better in the County now so people can live here and still work in the City and not have to be there. He believes more people will be competing for real estate.

Mr. Merrill remarked that there are areas in the County that may be off the radar and some of these remote businesses could relocate. There are some positives from a study like this.

Agreeing with Mr. Hinkley and Mr. Merrill, Mrs. Scott stated there are a lot of issues with the influx of people coming from the metro area; some will stay here since they can work

from home because of broadband availability.

Mr. Marshfield commented that analysis of this study will jumpstart the comprehensive plan.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Gladstone and adopted by the following vote: Ayes 4424, Noes 0, Absent 375 (Davis).

Chairman Molé granted privilege of the floor to Director of Planning and County Spokeswoman Shelly Johnson-Bennett for a COVID-19 update. Mrs. Johnson-Bennett stated that Phase IV will really be a partial Phase IV opening starting on Friday, June 26. Larger

gatherings at outdoor spaces are permitted, however malls and movie theaters cannot reopen at this time. Indoor gyms and spas cannot open, however, gyms can proceed with outdoor activities only.

She stated the governor is extremely nervous about mass gatherings, events, or festivals and is considering whether or not he wants to allow larger gatherings of any kind. The State Fair is not officially cancelled. This is a soft Phase IV opening.

In reply to Ms. Molé, Mrs. Johnson-Bennett stated that museums can reopen at 50% of the capacity of their building fire code. All indoor engagements have to be kept at 50% of the fire code capacity.

Ms. Molé stated that high school graduations can allow a maximum of 150 people. This number is specific to outdoor graduation ceremonies. Mass outdoor gatherings are limited to 25 people or less for all other events.

In response to Mr. Eisel, Mrs. Johnson-Bennett and Ms. Molé stated attendance at Town Board meetings is limited to 50% of the building fire code capacity to allow for social distancing. If social distancing is not possible then face masks are required. Legislative virtual meetings are being allowed through the end of July with an indication they may be extended long term.

Mrs. Johnson-Bennett reiterated that if social distancing is not possible, masks are required for in-person meetings and forums.

Regarding state funding during these uncertain times, Mr. Cetta opined the Town of Walton finds it may be best to spend whatever funding has been received so it cannot be taken away.

Upon a motion, the meeting was adjourned at 1:47 p.m.
